Edie and Gordon Small Land Donation



In 1972 Edie and Gordon Small purchased a Federal style house built on 17 acres of land in 1949 by Millie Mason, Arthur V.D. Chamberlain's sister. The parcel was originally part of the Arthur V.D. Chamberlain farm at the junction of Chamberlain and Taylor Roads. The house sits back from the road with a panoramic view in the back of rolling hills, an open field and a pond. The Smalls developed the pond with the help of a federal program several years ago. Edie Small's love for nature can be seen in her unusual animal sculptures displayed around the home and pool area.


Edie and Gordon have always loved the rural character of Mendon and the beauty of their land. Throughout the years they have maintained the wood-


lot of hardwood trees, conifers, shrubs and wildflowers. A mowed trail leads the visitor to the back portion of the site, with wooden bridges crossing Irondequoit Creek into the wooded area and up to the open field. After much consideration the Smalls decided to donate 11.8 acres to the Mendon Foundation for perpetual care and stewardship. Approximately 8 acres with the house and pond will become part of their estate.

The Mendon Foundation is the appropriate organization to donate their land, because they knew the parcel would be preserved and conserved in perpetuity according to their wishes. This scenic 11.8 acres contains an area of conifers and hardwood trees and shrubs intertwined with paths, with the Irondequoit Creek as the boundary for the property. The open field in the back of the property is a haven for songbirds and wild life. This area is a perfect setting for the New York State Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP). The planting of native grasses will attract several native songbirds to the area. It is their wish to maintain the

property as it is today and improve the open space to attract more songbirds and wildlife.

With this acquisition the Mendon Foundation now owns 148 acres of land. We are very grateful for the Small's donation and with the responsibility of stewardship of the land. Land donation provides a method for the landowner to protect, preserve and conserve the natural habitat, wildlife, vegetation and uniqueness of the property. 


A path leads to the open field portion of the Small property.



Public Tour Scheduled for Latest Conservation Project

The Mendon Foundation is scheduling a public tour of the Gonfalon Farm Wood Duck and Nature Preserve on Sept. 27th at 10 A.M. Farm owners Tim Pryor and Ellen Hickory Smith entered into a permanent conservation easement with the federal government, dedicating 12 acres of their land, located at 888 Pittsford Mendon Center Rd., for duck habitat.

Years ago, the land was used for celery and onion farming, but had become a mono-culture of cattails with no open water, except for old drainage ditches that were used when the farm was active.

When Tim and Ellen bought the farm in 1999, they had the "20-year plan," according to Ellen. "We knew what had to be done. We knew the wildlife needed open water, but we did not know how we were going to pay for the ponds to be dug. We did not know the first step in starting the permitting process. We thought that we would slowly try to rehab small portions, and perhaps we would have the project completed in 20 years."

But at a Mendon Foundation dinner in Spring of 2000, Tim and Ellen learned of the goverment program sponsored through the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture that pays landowners to restore farmed- and previously-farmed wetlands to animal habitat. "I called the next day to schedule an appointment. It was a win-win situation," Ellen said. "We could get the ponds

built to specifications for wildlife enhancement, we would still own the land, and we would not have to pay for the pond construction."

JoBeth Bellanca of the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service designed the project and took care of all the permits and paperwork. "All we had to do was add our signatures," Ellen explained.

In return, Tim and Ellen signed a permanent conservation easement with the government. "We still own the land. We still control access. We can allow hunting and fishing if we would like to do that. As part of the permit, we are allowed to build a boardwalk through the site," Ellen explained.

For nine days in July, John Dates of Dates Construction, dug ponds with irregular berms and connecting waterways, creating the perfect water habitat for wood ducks.

But it just isn't just the pond design that makes the perfect habitat for these seldom-seen ducks. The habitat of the surrounding land is equally important.

Wood ducks prefer heavily forested wetlands that are high in tree species diversity. They nest in open cavities within the forests that surrounds the wetlands. They will also nest in artificial nesting boxes in deciduous woodlands in close proximity to open water.

Wood ducks also need at least 10 acres of wetland in a contiguous unit, or in isolated parcels separated by no more than 100 feet of upland, in close proximity to nesting habitat to support brood rearing -- which is what the Gonfalon Farm parcel offers.

Food for young birds and adults differs dramatically. The early diet of ducklings consists

largely of insects, aquatic invertebrates, small fish, and other highprotein animal material. After six weeks of age, the young switch to plant foods until their diet consists of approximately 90% vegetative material, primarily aquatic plants such as algae, watermeal, watershield, sago pondweed, and duckweed.

Adult wood ducks feed on a variety of nuts and fruits, aquatic plants and seeds, and aquatic insects and other invertebrates. Insects and aquatic invertebrates are particularly important food items of adult hens during egg laying in spring.

Acorns, hickory nuts and seeds of sweet gum, buttonbush, arrowarum and burreed are common fall and winter foods. While many of these food sources are available on the 12 acre parcel donated by Tim and Ellen, the couple is also planting additional plant food sources as well as patches of wildflowers suitable for butterflies and hummingbirds.

According to the federal government, the largest threat to the future of the wood duck is the



continued loss of habitat. By restoring these old celery and onion fields back into a functioning freshwater wetland, Tim and Ellen are assisting in the continued success of wood ducks.

By all accounts, the Gonfalon Farm site is a stunning transformation. Within days of the first pond being built, frogs were hopping in and out of the water. Dragonflies were everywhere, and

in the evening swallows were swooping over the water catching bugs. Birds were at the pond edges drinking water that was not available only a few days before.

The Sept. 27th tour will be led by Jo Beth Bellanca of the Natural Resources Conservation Service. She will be available to answer questions on the USDA conservation program for interested landowners, and packets of information and applications will be available. 


