The Manor School Earthday Celebration offered several programs on understanding the importance of the earth and our role in caring for our environment. The programs were open to all Manor School students. Jim Engel of White Oak Nursery, designed a habitat garden, donated plant material and organized the students who did all of the work planting the garden. The high school students of Kim Agar's Environmental Studies class each teamed up with a Manor student to form a big and little team that planted the garden. Wildlife Biologist, John Hauber mesmerized his audience with slides of a variety of wildlife from the area complete with a display of animal skeletons and artifacts. Robin Long and her students from the environmental science class set up several student built interactive watershed displays complete with the creatures that inhabit these waters. Linda Driscoll, Delta Lab biologist, created a display of stream invertebrate creatures for students to touch and learn. Local bird specialist, John Nucitelli, presented a captivating slide presentation on birds of prey. Karen Waldron-Johnson organized the clean up of the school grounds with students collecting many bags of litter and trash. Harold Cogan's photography students took pictures of all the events and then gifted a copy to the Foundation.

The Environmental Committee was fortunate to have the following businesses donate to the Earthday Celebration: Friendly's Ice Cream, Lima Rotary, Ted Collins Nursery, Honeoye Falls Masonic Lodge, Bristol's Garden Center, Cornell Cooperative Extension, Countryside Flower Farm, Delta Lab, Village garden Store, Paradox Designs, White Oak Nursery, and the Mendon Foundation.

The Mendon Foundation presented to each Manor School student a tree seedling to take home and plant in remembrance of Earthday. The Mendon Foundation, in appreciation for the seedlings, received many thank you notes so beautifully written by the Manor School students.

The second event celebrating Earthday was held at the Mendon Foundation's Sibleyville Nature Reserve on April 23. Despite a rainy start to the day there was plenty of enthusiasm and excitement. Boy Scouts from Scout Troop 10 helped set up the tents and direct-







ed parking. Cindy Zauski's art students created Earthday posters that were placed in many business windows in Honeoye Falls and throughout the school.

There were displays on ecology and the environment set up under tents. Dr. Dan Marion and James Atwater presented a guided walk to learn to preserve and identify. Wildlife Biologist, John Hauber conducted a walking tour to learn about the local wildlife and their habitat. Kathy Tetlow conducted a guided bird walk to identify birds and their songs. Biologist, David Kitchie, presented a tour of Sibleyville's natural grasses. Jim Engel conducted a presentation on native landscaping and habitat planting. Margo Bauer and Robin Long talked about Honeoye Creek's ecosystem and the Monroe County Water Watch volunteer program.

This community is gifted with many students and adults who support and encourage the Mendon Foundation and who honored our first Earthday Celebration. 



Two Eagle Scout Projects go up on the Trail at Rochester Junction

The first of four Information Kiosks on the Leigh Valley Trail has been built at Rochester Junction by Christoph Napp as his Eagle Scout Project. The other three kiosks will be located on the Trail at Mendon, Rush, and East River Rd. Christoph and more than 25 friends, scouts and family spent 400 hours over 8 weekends to complete the project. Trail users for many decades to come, will be stopping there to admire their handiwork and read information about the trail.

The second Eagle Project is being built by Life Scout Garrett Koek and involves clearing the area of the old station, building a 32" high wall defining the station and installing a picnic area inside the station. Garrett's project is more


than half finished and should be completed by early fall.





Mendon Presbyterian Church... A unique opportunity.

As you may have heard, Mendon Presbyterian Church is in the process of building a new facility. You may not have heard that officials of the church have approached the Mendon Foundation to purchase its property on Route 251 in the Hamlet in the hope that the sanctuary- built over 100 years ago- will be preserved as an historic landmark.

The Board of the Mendon Foundation is enthusiastic about this opportunity to create an ideally located community center adjacent to the Mendon Station Park, but is daunted by challenges of raising funds to purchase and maintain a property of this magnitude. We believe that such a vast undertaking cannot suceed without the support of the residents in this area. Consequently, we are sharing this project with our readers and seeking feedback.

For those familiar with the Hamlet of Mendon, the church is located on the north side of Route 251 between the intersection of Route 64 and the area where the Lehigh Valley Trail crosses the

road. The property is centrally located in Mendon's second largest commercial area and the rear property line of the church abuts the Lehigh Valley Trail.

Not only is the church of historic importance, but next to it is one of the oldest buildings in the area...the original Presbyterian Church built in 1816 and, until recently, the Foggy Bottom Restaurant. Adjacent to the church on the west is Benicasa, once used as the church parsonage.

The church premises consist of a sanctuary that seats about 150 people, a multi-purpose room about the size of a basketball court, a commercial kitchen, smaller meeting rooms and many offices. Just as the space accommodated the multifaceted functions of an active church, the space is ideal for non-sectarian community programs and events such as meetings, lectures, performances, dinners, luncheons, displays, educational and recreational programs, a possible library branch, and other gatherings requiring ample space. The offices could be used by a number of community organizations. It would also be useful during the annual Mendon Arts Festival.

Ample parking exists on the church property and additional parking is available on Route 251 and down the street at the Little League parking area on Lehigh Valley Trail property.

This is an unusual opportunity for the community to preserve an historic and valuable community property. This undertaking is consistent with our Foundation's goals of preserving land, restoring wetlands, maintaining hiking and riding trails, creating the historic Mendon Station Park, participating in and sponsoring community events, and educating our youth and those young at heart about the importance of our environment.



Danny and Brian power washed the entire structure with a cleaning solution and sanded parts that were rough. Some decking screws and nails were replaced, and some of the actual hardware -- like chains -- were replaced. There are also new swings. After all of this was done, Danny sealed the entire structure.

The area is now professionally sprayed by Target Pest Control for yellow jackets and bees, which had been a continuing problem over the years.

Orginally, the play structure at the park was built in over a four-day period from May 15 - 18, 1986.

Msgr. Albert Schnacky, former Pastor of St. Catherine's Church in 1984, planted the seed for a park for the hamlet. Msgr. Schnacky talked to some parishioners regarding the fact that the hamlet had no park for its children and parents to enjoy. The baseball fields had been donated by St. Catherine's, and he generously offered additional land at St. Catherine's to be used for the park.

At this same time, a number of towns and local churches were building creative play-

grounds designed by Robert Leathers, an architect from Ithaca, NY. A core group of people, many of whom no longer live in the area, visited his local parks and talked with their coordinators.

The group met with other groups that had recently built parks in Greece and Victor, and then contacted Robert Leathers in 1985. At this time, they started raising about \$4000 to pay for the design day.

This first step was realized on July 11th, 1985 when Robert came to the Chancy Center. About 50 children who lived in Mendon came that day to design the park. The children of Mendon drew pictures of their park and talked with Leathers. Leathers used the childrens' ideas and designed the park that we now have.

The price of the materials was about \$30,000. The cost of the labor was \$0, all donated by the members of the community. The core group expanded into a myriad of committees and started extensive fund raising efforts.

The volunteers established a a "Buy a Board" campaign, a phone-a-thon, a wine tasting and numerous other projects. Many local citizens donated generously. Local businesses donated their products for the play structure at cost or below.


The businesses who contributed to this effort have their names on the plaques located on the kiosk in front of the park.

The entire community was saddened by the death of Msgr. Schnacky on January 22, 1986. His final wish was to have the community build the park and he requested that any donations be given for the construction of the park. The gifts in his honor pushed the funding raising over the top.

The spring of 1986 was a beehive of activity. Groups of volunteers had located a vast array of the materials needed. Robert and his team insisted on quality materials — nothing less than the best would do. This is why the structure still exists today!

On the actual building days, child care was provided to encourage volunteers. Volunteers were asked to sign up for a day, a half-day or whatever they could spare.


The two building foremen hired from Robert Leather's firm showed up on Wednesday, May 15, 1986 to start the process to drill the holes for the main supports of the structure. Only a few volunteers were needed that day since much of the work that needed to be

done was accomplished with heavy machinery. The people who came that day, came back the next day and the next day.

The lists of volunteers swelled as the residents of Mendon saw the playground rise from the ground. In all over 200 hundred people worked on the park, many for more than one day, some from start to finish.

On Sunday, May 18, 1986 the playground was dedicated in honor Msgr. Schnacky. Later a brass plaque was designed with a likeness of the Monsignor and his beloved German shepherd dog, Heidi, from a picture taken shortly before his death. The plaque is attached to a large rock near the base of the kiosk with the donation signs and has one of his favorite sayings:

It's not what I preach on Sunday. What counts is the way I live my life the other six days of the week.

The park stands today as a commitment of the people of Mendon to its children.

Students Dig In

August 27th will be a full and interesting day for 1208 incoming freshman from the University of Rochester and the Eastman School of Music (1088, 120 respectively) as they fulfill their Community Service Project requirement. U of R senior and Student Intern Patricia Waters, a graduate of East Ridge HS tells Pathways this is a tradition of 17 years, with this year's theme "Bridging university and community 1 person at a time." The program originates from the Dean of Students office with 3 goals:
